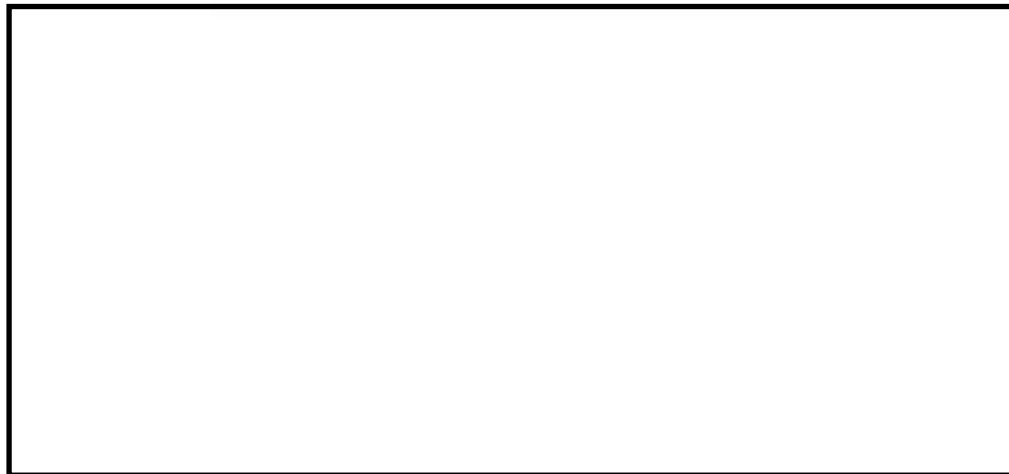
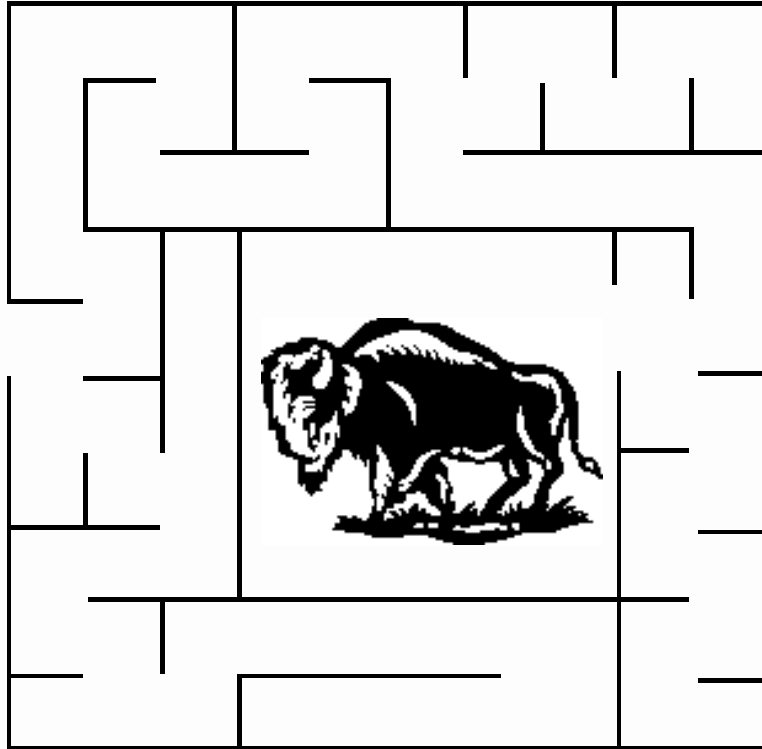


BISON HUNT

The first bison-hide tipi in 100 years made in Saskatchewan using traditional methods was created for this Gallery.

Between 1830 and 1879, the average "buffalo hunter" could kill 250 bison a day.

Artifacts have been discovered in Saskatchewan that date back 10,000 years!

The last bison killed in Saskatchewan was in 1879 near Moose Mountain.

Saskatchewan comes from the Cree word for fast flowing river.

The eagle is sacred to many First Nations groups because it is believed it flies closest to the Creator.

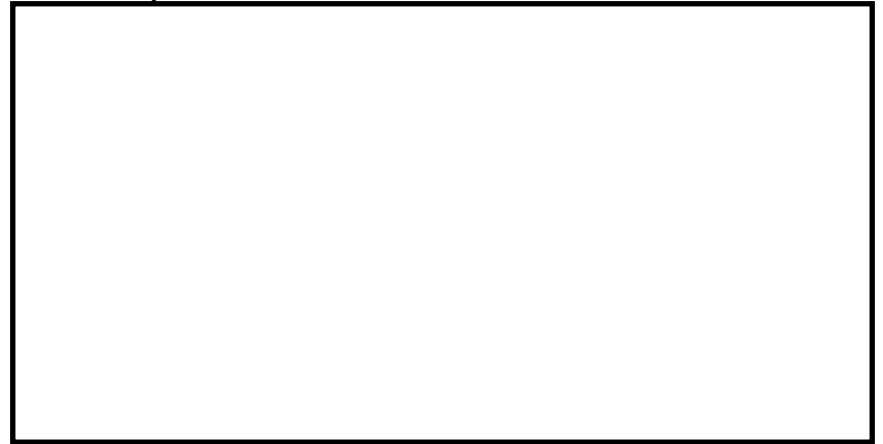
